Banned Books Week


The mission of the annually recognized Banned Books Week is a simple one: to celebrate our freedom to read what we want to read. Starting September 27, libraries, bookstores, writers and readers across the country will work to draw attention to the harm that censorship causes.

Why do books get challenged?

Generally, books are challenged when someone feels that the content is inappropriate or offensive. Reasons vary, but the most common are sexual content, offensive language and that the book being challenged is not suitable for a certain age group.

So what does it mean when a book is banned? If a person or organization is able to successfully challenge a book, effectively having it removed

from a public library or a school curriculum, it is considered banned. However, more often than not, these challenges stay just that: challenges. Books are rarely successfully banned, thanks to the persistence of community members (and your local librarian) who wish to protect our

Oct. 29th at 5:30



Many of the books that have been challenged or banned are literary classics that have influenced and inspired generations of readers and writers. Since 1982, Banned Books Week has been an observance of the importance of intellectual freedom and its necessity in maintaining a free democracy.



Storytimes and Fun Fridays in Severance


